Law enforcement gives tips for traveling this Labor Day

Labor Day weekend, another summer holiday for people to gather and relax, is here.

But, if you're not careful, you could find yourself stressed out with a ticket or behind bars. And there's nothing relaxing about that.

To keep drivers on the right path this weekend, Sumter's law enforcement agencies offer the following advice.

ADVICE FOR HOLIDAY TRAVEL THIS WEEKEND

- Plan ahead;
- Leave early;
- Buckle up;
- Have alternate routes;
- Be patient; and
- Stay alert and call 911 in an emergency.

Sumter Police Department encourages residents and visitors to make safety a personal priority and lock vehicles before leaving them this holiday.

If you plan to go out of town, have a

trusted relative or friend pick up your mail, newspapers and other items that will be delivered to your house, said Tonyia McGirt, public information officer for the police department. You can also place a hold on your newspaper until you return, she said.

Do not announce on social media that you will be away from your house, McGirt said. And make sure all doors to the house and vehicles are locked and all outdoor equipment and other belongings are secured, she said.

If you plan to consume alcohol, McGirt said, have a designated driver or use a transportation service.

"Never drive drunken, drugged or

distracted," she said.

McGirt said anyone who encounters a reckless driver should immediately call 911 and report the location, direction of travel and as much information about the vehicle as possible.

Drivers should also stay alert and look out for children playing, pedestrians, bicyclists and alternative vehicles such as golf carts.

"Adhere to all traffic signals and signs," she said.

Do not leave children and pets inside locked vehicles even for a short period of time or with the car running, she

A 'seedsman' farmer at heart

Bradford pouring his passion into industrial hemp production for S.C.

Given the rise of mass production in commercial agriculture in the second half of the 20th century, a seedsman farmer — one who deals in seeds as a profession — has become rare, a lost art form if you will.

But Nat Bradford describes himself as one, and his family has 200 years of experience at it in Sumter to prove it, successfully growing watermelons, okra, collards and corn for small sales all across the state.

Now he's applying his experience and passion for "seedsman-ship" to the state's new pilot program to grow industrial hemp for research purposes.

State Agricultural Commissioner Hugh Weathers and members of his staff are touring the state to visit all 20 of the state's hemp farmers in the pilot program, and on Thursday they stopped by Bradford Family Farm to talk with Bradford and see how things are going.

Bradford is a "lone ranger" in the state program, however. He's the only one of the 20 permitted farmers headed in the agricultural grain production route with hemp. The other 19 are experimenting with hemp for Cannabidiol — or CBD — production. CBD has attracted attention for its

Flood ordinance change could mean savings for homeowners

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Sumter County Council approved second readings of ordinances that could bring more savings for some homeowners with flood insurance and provide private roadways to multiple property owners.

FLOOD ORDINANCE UPDATE BRINGS COMPLIANCE, POSSIBLE FUTURE SAVINGS

Reading: Second of three

Agenda item: An ordinance to amend portions of the Sumter County Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance to adopt the Wateree Watershed Maps and Flood Insurance Study revisions that will go into effect on Sept. 28; and to update the ordinance to make corrections and clarifications noted in the 2017 South Carolina Department of Natural Resources Community Assistance Visit and the Community Rating System Cycle Visit.

Background: The five main changes to the ordinance will include: required updates; the addition of language stating all permit applications will be reviewed to determine each

proposed site is reasonably safe from flooding; the addition of a section to address standards for areas with base flood elevations but no floodways; the addition of language that clarifies flood-proofing requirements for commercial buildings; and the reorganization of the ordinance.

These changes are necessary to keep the county's flood prevention ordinance in compliance with the National Flood Insurance program, which eventually leads to savings for some flood insurance holders.

Sumter mayor awards 2 with highest civilian city honor

Two Sumter residents recently received the city's highest honor given to a citizen by the mayor.

Mayor Joseph T. McElveen Jr. bestowed the Gamecock City Society Award to Roger Ackerman and Dr. Mary Elizabeth Blanchard accompanied with an official proclamation from the city.

"Recipients of this award are true community servants," McElveen said. "They have displayed exemplary service to the citizens of the Sumter community and beyond."

The Gamecock City Society Award is the most prestigious honor the City of Sumter can give to any one person. It began under McElveen's tenure as mayor in 2006 as a way to honor Sumterites who have made a meaningful contribution over a lifetime to the improvement of the Sumter community and its residents. Previous recipients have been congressmen, volunteers, entertainers, Tuskegee airmen and others.

Ackerman is a businessman and generous contributor to worthwhile causes such as the creation of the CART Fund, a program through the Sumter Rotary Club to support Alzheimer's research. The program was eventually, and still is, used throughout Rotary International.

Ackerman was also instrumental in the creation of the new Temple Sinai Jewish Heritage Center, now part of the Sumter County Museum Complex. He is also a recipient of the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest award given to an individual for excellent service.

Blanchard was the first female obstetrics and gynecology physician in South Carolina. She has made significant contributions to the well-being of Sumterites with her involvement in the Sumter Mental Health Association, Sumter Art Association, Sumter County Gallery of Art, Sumter-Shaw Community Council and the Sumter Little Theatre.

Blanchard and Ackerman's names will be permanently commemorated on a plaque, with other Gamecock City Society Award recipients, at City Hall.

Army veteran to mark 1 year as business owner on Saturday

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Saturday will mark one year in business downtown for retired U.S. Army combat soldier and first-time business owner

Joe Davies and his Jersey Joe's Custom Apparel shop.

He said Year 1

has been a wild ride with "lots of long days and nights," but he's exceeded his own expectations with sales of all types of customized apparel, via direct-to-garment printing. That includes T-shirts, hoodies, long-sleeve shirts, hats, shoes, backpacks, bags and Koozies, among other items.

The shop's T-shirt printer can produce 2.8 million different colors, he said.

"That's why we tell people there are no color limitations," Davies said. "We have the ability to provide anything for anyone. That's what makes this a fun business."

A newspaper article on Jersey Joe's opening a year ago brought in customers for the first four months, he said, and since then he's continued to build his customer base through social media marketing on Facebook and Instagram.

He said he's shipped sales of his custom apparel to more than 40 states and

internationally as well during the first 12 months.

Jersey Joe's clientele runs the gamut, from youth to older populations, with something for everyone, he said.

Sales have increased every month, he said. In April, Davies added a business partner in co-owner Brittany Polard.

During the last two months, the shop has expanded by adding a new commercial-level embroidery machine and a full-color vinyl printer.

He said Jersey Joe's prides itself on same-day turn-

Man gets prison for threatening U.S. senators

MACON, Ga. (AP) — A Georgia man has been sentenced to two-and-a-half years in prison for threatening two U.S. senators.

Federal prosecutors say Jason Kenneth Bell of Cochran called the office of New York Democratic Sen. Chuck Schumer in March 2017. He said in messages that if Schumer didn't have personal protection, "I would hit you until I couldn't lift my arms anymore."

Bell also called the office of Sen. Tim Scott, R-S.C., in October 2017. He threatened to kill Scott and asked "are we as white people supposed to just stand for this injustice" or do what Dylann Roof did. Roof was convicted of killing nine black people at a church in Charleston.

Bell was sentenced Thursday. He had pleaded guilty to two counts of anonymous telecommunications harassment.

Originally from Virginia, Gregory received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Sculpture with a Minor in Printmaking, magna cum laude, from Virginia Commonwealth University. The materials they used in combination reveal the tensions between low art and high art. Through their use with form, I am leveling the playing field."

A lecture by Gregory and a reception will be held in

the University Gallery from 5:30 to 7 p.m. Friday, Oct. 26. Light refreshments will be provided.

Jeanine Jacildone's "It's All In My Head" is on exhibit in the Upstairs Gallery in the Williams-Brice-Edwards Administration Building on the USC Sumter campus.

Jacildone is a native of Elgin, Illinois, and moved to South Carolina in 1987. She is retired from both the U.S. Air Force and Federal Civil Service. She has had a varied career working as a heavy equipment operator, printing press operator, horse

trainer, human resources manager, liaison for the United States Embassy in Helsinki, Finland, intelligence analyst, aviation resource manager and currently a certified permaculture designer. Jacildone has sketched all of her life but never had the courage to

"Even as a child, I had intense visions in my head that I wanted to share with

others, but verbal communication often escaped me," Jacildone said. "Through art, I can share love, anger, joy, sadness, playfulness and intrigue. I found that images conveyed my feelings and messages far more effectively than my words. Painting and sketching and landscaping are my preferred means of artistic expression. I want to show my audience the unique and the unexpected that can be found in the common and the ordinary."

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The Labor Day the boat turned over

We always spent Christmas with Granny in Kissimmee, Florida. Easter, we always spent with Mamma's brother and sister in Okeechobee. And for some reason, we always spent Labor Day at cousin Jack's place on Lake Lotela in Avon Park. Everybody would bring some food, and Jack would pull whoever wanted to ski. He was the only person I knew who had an inboard motor on his boat. In those days, riding in a boat was a big deal. It was something that gave you status on the preschool playground.

One year, my cousin Ross brought his boat. Compared to Jack's, it was a sorry excuse for a boat. Nothing more than a souped-up jon boat, it had a tiny Evinrude outboard motor that looked and sounded like an electric mixer. Still, Ross spent the day riding kids around in his boat. We didn't care about the size; we were thrilled.

It got to be late in the day, and Mamma said we'd be leaving soon. My sister and brother begged Ross to take them for one more ride. There is nothing like the persistence of children to wear you down. Mamma said "yes," and off they went. I was told to play in the shallow water and not drown.

I couldn't have been more than four, but I remember looking at the boat as it left the dock with my brother Steve and sister Clemie Jo sticking their tongues out at me. Sometimes, it is sheer torture to be the youngest.

Ross knew how to make the ride exciting. He'd open the throttle on that glorified mixer and jump the wake left by Jack's ski boat. The kids would experience a micro-second of no gravity and squeal in delight. He'd cut the boat sharp and make everyone hold on for dear life. This is what we called "fun" before people thought you had to go to Disney World and pay hundreds of dollars to laugh and scream.

The old folks hollered at Ross to head in. Ross decided

to give the kids one more thrill. He turned the boat sharply left and cut back across his own wake. The boat dipped toward the water, the kids slid, and then, the unthinkable happened. Ross mistimed his recovery. The turn was too sharp, and the boat flipped.

I still remember it. A second before, I could see Clemie Jo and Steve's heads; the next second, all I saw was the upside hull of Ross' boat. Then Ross' head bobbed up. The old folks on shore were hollering. What we couldn't see was that Steve and Clemie Jo had surfaced on the other side of the boat. Jack saw what happened, carefully maneuvered his boat closer and pulled everyone on board.

It all happened so fast, Mamma didn't even have time to cry, but I did. I started bawling with tears the size of thunderstorm raindrops. Naturally everyone thought I was upset about my brother and sister. I remember Aunt Iris, saying "Son, stop crying, it's all right. See, everybody is safe."

I blurted out through my tears, with my lip poked out, "It's not fair! I want to be in the boat when it turns over! Clemie Jo and Steve always get to have fun!"

Too many of us who follow Jesus pout because it looks like everyone else is having fun, even when their lives turn upside down. We fail to fully embrace the path of Jesus because we're afraid the best life is out there, living dangerously, oblivious.

I think Jesus would say to us, "Stop pouting. I've saved you for a better life. The greater joy is life with me."

And if you are in the middle of the lake and your adventure boat has turned over, I have good news for you. Jesus has come for you. His hand is stretched out, ready to pull you to the safety of his grace, to the future he has for you.

Stop pouting. Start following. An overturned boat in the middle of the lake is not God's plan for you.

Can you be Christian and support the death penalty?

Pope Francis has declared the death penalty "inadmissible." This means that the death penalty should not be used in any circumstance. It also alters the Catholic Catechism, a compendium of Catholic doctrine, and is now binding on Roman Catholics throughout the world.

But in spite of his definitive statement, Pope Francis' act will probably only deepen the debate about whether Christians can support capital punishment.

As a Catholic scholar who writes about religion, politics and policy, I understand how Christians struggle with the death penalty — some cannot endure the idea, and others support it as a way to deter and punish terrible crimes. Some Christian theologians have also observed that capital punishment could actually lead to a change of heart among criminals who might repent when faced with the finality of death.

Is the death penalty un-Christian?

THE TWO SIDES

In its early centuries, Christianity was seen with suspicion by authorities. Writing in defense of Christians who were unfairly charged with crimes in second-century Rome, philosopher Anthenagoras of Athens condemned the death penalty and wrote that Christians "cannot endure even to see a man put to death, though justly."

But as Christianity became more connected with state power, European Christian monarchs and governments regularly carried out the death penalty until its abolition in the 1950s through the European Convention on Human Rights. In the Western world, today, only the United States and Belarus retain capital punishment for crimes not committed during wartime. But China, and many nations in the Middle East, South Asia and Africa still apply the death penalty.

According to a 2015 Pew Research Center Survey, support for the death penalty is falling worldwide. However, in the United States a majority of white Protestants and Catholics continue to be in favor of it.

Critics of the American justice system argue that the deterrence value of capital punishment is debatable. There are also studies showing that, in the United States, capital punishment is unfairly applied, especially to blacks.

CHRISTIAN VIEWS

In the Hebrew Bible, Exodus 21:12 states that "whoever strikes a man so that he dies shall be put to death." In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus, however, rejects the notion of retribution when he

says "if anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also."

While it is true that the Hebrew Bible prescribes capital punishment for a variety of offenses, it is also true that later Jewish jurists set out rigorous standards for the death penalty so that it could be used only in rare circumstances.

At issue in Christian considerations of the death penalty is whether the state has the obligation to punish criminals and defend its citizens.

St. Paul, an early Christian evangelist, wrote in his letter to the Romans that a ruler acts as "an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer." The Middle Ages in Europe saw thousands of murderers, witches and heretics put to death. While church courts of this period generally did not carry out capital punishment, they did turn criminals over to secular authorities for execution.

Thirteenth-century Catholic philosopher Thomas Aquinas argued that the death penalty could be justified for the greater welfare of society. Later Protestant reformers also supported the right of the state to impose capital punishment. John Calvin, a Protestant theologian and reformer, argued that Christian forgiveness did not mean overturning established laws.

THE POSITION OF POPE FRANCIS

Among Christian leaders, Pope Francis has been at the forefront of arguing against the death penalty.

The letter accompanying the Pope's declaration makes several points. First, it acknowledges that the Catholic Church has previously taught that the death penalty is appropriate in certain instances. Second, the letter argues that modern methods of imprisonment effectively protect society from criminals. Third, the letter states that this development of Catholic doctrine is consistent with the thought of the two previous popes: St. Pope John Paul II and Benedict XVI.

St. John Paul II maintained that capital punishment should be reserved only for "absolute necessity." Benedict XVI also supported efforts to eliminate the death penalty.

Most important, however, is that Pope Francis is emphasizing an ethic of forgiveness. The Pope has argued that social justice applies to all citizens. He also believes that those who harm society should make amends through acts that affirm life, not death.

For Pope Francis, the dignity of the human person and the sanctity of life are the core values of Christianity, regardless of the circumstances.

Find a support group to create lasting, healthy changes

As human beings, we are frequently influenced by our surroundings and our environment. Whether it is positive or negative, that is our perception. The decision to engage in either type of behavior, that is our choice.

While our chosen social networks provide support, evidence suggests that the process of observing someone engaging in a behavior is more powerful at influencing our own behaviors. Research concludes that observation is more valuable in assisting with behavior change than assessing someone's current behavior and providing feedback.

behavior or strategy which enhances confidence in modeling the same behavior. Although, in order for it to be truly effective and modeled, the individual who is modeling the behavior must be successful at the task. These habits that are learned behaviors from friends and family play a crucial role in daily life, which ultimately impacts overall health and well-being.

While this works for adults, research shows this doesn't work the same with children and adults. As parents, we expect if we teach them right, they are less likely to fall into unhealthy behaviors. But that isn't the case. Children are much more influenced by their

peers than their parents and are more likely to model another child's behavior. When children see other children being successful, they think they can succeed as well. On the other hand, when a child struggles with a task, an observing peer thinks he or she will struggle too.

According to the cognitive social learning theory, the most important prerequisite for behavior change is a person's sense of self-efficacy or the conviction that one is able to successfully execute the behavior required in order to produce the desired outcome. People can feel susceptible to an illness, expect to benefit if they change their behavior and perceive their social environment as encouraging the change, but if they lack a belief that they can change, their efforts are not likely to succeed.

Human behavior plays a central role in the maintenance of health and the prevention of disease. Social networks reinforce behavior patterns by accepting the identified behavior as normal. We tend to imitate behaviors that we see, so the association with healthy individuals can promote positive health behaviors in yourself.

Likewise, the association with those who have unhealthy habits can lead you to adopt those same behaviors. This may be why support groups are so effective. For lasting change, surround yourself with those who model the behaviors you want to initiate and sustain.

Senate Democrats want Boeing to negotiate with union in South Carolina

COLUMBIA (AP) — Nearly two dozen Democratic U.S. senators are calling on Boeing Co. to negotiate with a union now representing some employees at a South Carolina plant.

On Wednesday, 23 Senate Democrats penned a letter to Boeing CEO Dennis Muilenburg, asking the company to recognize the International

Association of Machinists, as the company has at its facilities in the state of Washington.

"Boeing's accomplishments would not have been possible without the skills, dedication and ingenuity of the IAMWA workers that build your planes," wrote the lawmakers, which include both senators from Washington, Maria Cantwell and Patty Murray.

South Carolina's U.S. senators, both Republicans, are not signatories to the letter.

Flight-line employees at Boeing's North Charleston plant decided in May to join the Machinists. The aerospace giant campaigned against the organizers, losing a last-minute request to delay the election after an anti-union social media campaign.

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Study: Mom's prenatal opioids may stunt children's learning

CHICAGO — Learning disabilities and other special education needs are common in children born with opioid-related symptoms from their mother's drug use while pregnant, according to the first big U.S. study to examine potential long-term problems in these infants.

About 1 in 7 affected children required special classroom services for problems including developmental delays and speech or language difficulties, compared with about 1 in 10 children not exposed to opioids before birth, the study found.

The study highlights the "absolutely critical" importance of early detection and intervention, before these children reach school age, to give them a better chance of academic success, said Dr. Nathalie Maitre, a developmental specialist at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. "It really confirms what those of us who do neurodevelopment follow-up of these children are seeing."

The study involved about 7,200 children aged 3 to 8 enrolled in Tennessee's Medicaid program. Nearly 2,000 of them were born with what's called newborn abstinence syndrome. It's a collection of symptoms caused by withdrawal from their pregnant mother's use of opioid drugs like prescription painkillers, heroin or fentanyl. The drugs can pass through the placenta into the developing nervous system.

Tremors, hard-to-soothe crying, diarrhea and difficulty feeding and sleeping are among signs that infants are going through withdrawal.

In Tennessee, hard hit by the nation's opioid epidemic, the rate of affected infants soared from less than one per 1,000 hospital births in 1999 to 13 per 1,000 births in 2015.

Whether the study results would apply elsewhere is uncertain, but in Tennessee, most children born with withdrawal symptoms are enrolled in that state's Medicaid program. Also in Tennessee, a syndrome diagnosis qualifies kids to receive early intervention services.

Maitre, who wasn't involved in the study, said she suspects the research may underestimate the magnitude of the problem, because it only captures kids who haven't slipped through the cracks.

The only previous comparable study was in Australia, published last year, showing that affected children had worse academic test scores in seventh grade than other kids.

The new study looked at how many kids were referred for possible learning disabilities and received school-based services for related difficulties. It did not examine academic performance.

Results were released Thursday by the journal *Pediatrics*.

The researchers said taking into account other factors that could affect children's development — including birth weight and mothers' education and tobacco use — didn't change the results.

Study co-author Dr. William Schaffner of Vanderbilt University said it makes sense that opioid use in pregnancy could affect children's later development. Some studies have found brain differences in affected children including in a region involved in certain types of learning.

But Dr. Mary-Margaret Fill, the lead author and a researcher with Tennessee's health department, said these children "are definitely not doomed. There are great programs and services that exist to help these children and their families. We just have to make sure they get plugged in."



Despite strong economy, many Americans struggling to get by

Despite a strong economy, about 40 percent of American families struggled to meet at least one of their basic needs last year, including paying for food, health care, housing or utilities.

That's according to an Urban Institute survey of nearly 7,600 adults that found that the difficulties were most prevalent among adults with lower incomes or health issues. But it also revealed that people from all walks of life were running into similar hardships.

The findings issued Tuesday by the non-profit research organization highlight the financial strains experienced by many Americans in an otherwise strong economy.

The average unemployment rate for 2017 was 4.4 percent, a low that followed years of decline. But having a job doesn't ensure families will be able to meet their basic needs, said Michael Karpman, one of the study's authors. Among the households with at least one working adult, more than 30 percent reported hardship.

"Economic growth and low unemployment alone do not ensure everyone can meet their basic needs," the authors wrote.

Food insecurity was the most common challenge: More than 23 percent of households struggled to feed their family at some point during the year. That was followed by problems paying a family medical bill, reported by about 18 percent. A similar percentage didn't seek care for a medical need

because of the cost.

Additionally, roughly 13 percent of families missed a utility bill payment at some point during the year. And 10 percent of families either didn't pay the full amount of their rent or mortgage, or they paid it late.

While startling data to some, it comes as no surprise to those Americans who are struggling to get by.

Debra Poppelaars of Nashville, Tennessee, underwent spinal fusion surgery last fall and was diagnosed with breast cancer shortly thereafter. Although she is insured, she owes roughly \$19,000 for her portion of the medical bills.

Between disability, a job change and the mounting debt, she hasn't been able to make ends meet and is now facing bankruptcy.

"It's very hard at 64 years old; I look back and think I am in this position and I should be able to retire," she said.

Jerri Wood of Renton, Washington, says she makes choices each month to pay one bill instead of another as she struggles to pay for her health care. Wood has lived for years with a brain tumor that requires regular monitoring and was recently diagnosed with diabetes that she takes insulin to manage.

Rising costs for her care, even with insurance, have her juggling bills to get by — such as paying her cellphone or electricity bill one month and not the next. And she still feels like one of the lucky ones as she is able to survive.

"There is such a need for safety nets; so many people are in this position," she said.



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Shoppers are in the mood to spend

Chain stores are updating websites, speeding up delivery

NEW YORK — The store isn't dead for Home Depot, Kohl's, Best Buy or Target. Many traditional chains have posted strong sales, both online and at stores, as people are in a mood to spend.

What's driving it? A booming economy and companies' own efforts to try to Amazon-proof their businesses. That means making their stores more pleasant, updating their websites and speeding up delivery.

The bounce is a welcome reprieve from talk of a retail apocalypse that flourished after a spate of bankruptcies. Plenty of stores are still struggling, particularly mall clothing chains like Victoria's Secret and department stores like Sears. So is it the start of a sustainable revival?

"It's a retail renaissance for a core group of retailers," said Ken Perkins, president of research firm Retail Metrics. "They're set to glide on this path for a couple of years," he

added. "But specialty apparel stores are going to struggle."

Here are some of the main trends right now.

A STRONG ECONOMY: Shoppers are spending more freely in an economy that has recently grown at the fastest pace in nearly four years. Unemployment is near an 18-year low. Average hourly wages rose 2.7 percent in July from a year earlier.

"There's no doubt that, like others, we're currently benefiting from a very strong consumer environment, perhaps the strongest I've seen in my career," Target CEO Brian Cornell told investors. Target saw sales at established stores post the strongest growth in 13 years. Customer numbers in stores and online had their best showing since at least 2008.

Walmart similarly posted the largest increase for same-store sales in more than a decade. Best Buy had its biggest second-quarter same-store sales boost in 15 years. These three retailers, along with Home Depot, Lowe's, Kohl's

and others raised their outlooks.

FASTER OPTIONS AT THE STORE: Stores are catering better to time-conscious shoppers with delivery and pickup services that take advantage of their store networks.

Walmart has curbside grocery pickup at 1,800 stores, and is expanding its pickup towers, which serve up items ordered online within seconds. Target says it's reduced the wait time for curbside pickup to 2 minutes. Target has also found where it's testing same-day delivery for store shoppers the average basket size is more than \$200, the highest of any service it provides.

Though Walmart has dropped mobile checkout at its namesake stores, others like Macy's and Kroger are embracing it. Urban Outfitters says more shoppers than it expected are using self-checkout at its store in Manhattan's Herald Square.

"It's all about instant gratification," says Faith Hope Conso, chairman of Douglas Elliman's retail group.

Walmart overhauled its website with a special emphasis on fashion and home goods and has special sections dedicated to Lord & Taylor as part of

their partnership and for the outdoor brand Moosejaw it bought last year. Consolo cited Nordstrom and Bloomingdale's as others that have made their sites easier to shop.

"Retailers are putting together an internet-friendly site that's easy to navigate," said C. Britt Beemer, chairman of America's Research Group.

McCain's 106-year-old mom to attend Washington services

WASHINGTON — John McCain's rebellious streak didn't come out of nowhere. His mother, Roberta, had a habit of speeding behind the wheel and racking up tickets. When told during a trip to Europe that she was too old to rent a car, she went out and bought a Peugeot. Her son once answered the telephone to hear his mother say she was on a cross-country driving trip — by herself, in her 90s.

Now 106, the wife of a Navy admiral and mother of a Navy captain lived a life full of travel and adventure, punctuated by her sass and determination.

She once said her son liked to hold her up as an example of "what he hopes his lifespan will be."

But in the end, she is mourning him instead of the other way around.

Though slowed by a stroke, she is expected to attend memorial and burial services in Washington and Maryland later this week for the middle son she called "Johnny," the Vietnam prisoner of war, congressman, senator and two-time presidential candidate who died of brain cancer on Saturday at age 81.

The senator said in one of his books

that "my mother was raised to be a strong, determined woman who thoroughly enjoyed life, and always tried to make the most of her opportunities. She was encouraged to accept, graciously and with good humor, the responsibilities and sacrifices her choices have required of her. I am grateful to her for the strengths she taught me by example."

McCain's father, too, had a penchant for living large, with the senator recalling that a predilection for "quick tempers, adventurous spirits and love for the country's uniform" was encoded in his family DNA.

A native of Muskogee, Oklahoma, Roberta Wright was nearly 21 and a college student in southern California when she eloped to Tijuana, Mexico, in January 1933 with a young sailor named John S. McCain Jr. He would go on to become a Navy admiral, like the father he shared a name with, and the couple would have three children — Jean, John and Joseph — within a decade.

With her husband away on Navy business most of the time, Roberta McCain raised the kids. She didn't complain and loved Navy life. The family lived in Hawaii, the Panama Canal Zone — where the senator was born in 1936 — Connecticut, Virginia

and many points in between.

"To me, the Navy epitomizes everything that's good in America," she told C-SPAN in 2008 during the presidential contest John McCain lost to Barack Obama.

John McCain followed his father and grandfather's footsteps into the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, where he'll be laid to rest on Sunday. He became a fighter pilot and joined the combat action in Vietnam. He was on his 23rd bombing run over North Vietnam when he was shot out of the sky and taken prisoner in October 1967.

His parents were in London getting ready to attend a dinner at Iran's embassy when a special phone that Roberta McCain says she never touched rang while her husband was in the shower. She answered and listened as a friend told her two planes had been shot down and none of the pilots had ejected. She told her husband when he came out of the shower, and they kept to their plans.

"We went and decided we were not going to say one word at this dinner," she said in the 2008 interview.

She said that later learning her son was alive and had become a prisoner of war was "the best news I ever had in my life."

Roberta McCain missed watching her son's release from Vietnam on television in 1973. Someone telephoned and told her to watch the TV, something she said she did little of. "These people came off, and the television stopped, so I turned off the television," she explained. "I didn't know that between ads he did come off ... and I missed it."

She later said she was "ashamed" of her son for the "terrible language" he used toward the Vietnamese captors who tortured him.

"I never would have believed in this world he would ever use language like that, but he did," Roberta McCain said in the interview, which was conducted at her Washington home.

Well into her 90s, she became a fixture on John McCain's 2008 campaign, connecting with audiences and displaying some of the sass and wit he appeared to have inherited from her. John McCain wrote in his final book, published this year, that his 106-year-old mother's "vivaciousness is a force of nature" but that although a stroke has slowed her once-brisk pace and has made speaking a "chore," she still has "a spark in her, a brightness in her eyes that would light up the world if she could resume her peripatetic life."

MANNING — What pairs better than locally grown vegetables, talented caterers and a bevy of hungry guests?

It's not a very well-kept secret in Clarendon County that if you feed them, they will come.

This year, Main Street Manning is hosting an event that will bring local growers, manufacturers and citizens together for a delicious two-hour event, Farm to Table, which will be held from 6-8 p.m. in the courtyard at Land, Parker & Welch Law Firm at the corner of South Mill and Keitt streets.

"This is unlike anything that we've ever done," said Carrie Trebil, director of Main Street Manning, a department of the City of Manning. "We plan on having a great time and a lot of wonderful food."

"That's wonderful news for our local farmers," she added.





Suddenly I understand how the Reformation happened

WASHINGTON — For the first time, I understand how the Reformation happened.

Reading the stunning letter from Archbishop Carlo Maria Vigano — in which the former papal nuncio says he had personally informed Pope Francis

five years ago about the serious accusations against then-Cardinal Theodore McCarrick — is both heartbreaking and engaging. If Vigano is right, it means the corruption in the Catholic Church has reached not just the highest levels of

Roman Curia, but the papacy itself.

Last week, Vigano effectively nailed his 95 theses to the door of St. Peter's. The archbishop called out not only the Holy Father, but also more than a dozen cardinals he says covered up McCarrick's alleged abuses, including three successive Vatican secretaries of state — and calls for Pope Francis to step down. It is virtually without precedent for a Vatican insider to make such serious charges against a sitting pontiff and members of the Curia — much less to call for the pope's resignation. Vigano's allegations need to be investigated, the documents he cites

need to be released, and the pope needs to answer these charges.

Vigano said he twice wrote to his superiors in Rome, in 2006 and 2008, explaining that McCarrick had, among other things, requested “depraved acts of seminarians and priests,” had derided “a young seminarian who tried to resist” and engaged in the “sacrilegious celebration of the Eucharist.” He got no response. Eventually, he learned that Pope Benedict XVI had ordered that McCarrick be “forbidden to celebrate [Mass] in public, to participate in public meetings, to give lectures, [or] to travel.” Vigano said he personally discussed the sanctions in his first meeting with McCarrick at the Nunciature.

After Benedict resigned, Vigano was granted a private audience with the new pope on June 23, 2013, during which Francis asked him about McCarrick. Vigano wrote that he told Francis, “Holy Father, I don't know if you know Cardinal McCarrick, but if you ask the Congregation for Bishops there is a dossier this thick about him. He corrupted generations of seminarians and priests and Pope Benedict ordered him to withdraw to a life of prayer and penance.” Francis soon lifted Benedict's sanctions, Vigano said, and made McCarrick a trusted adviser. “He knew from at least June 23, 2013, that McCarrick was a serial predator,” Vigano wrote. “It was only when he

was forced by the report of the abuse of a minor ... that he took action.”

Vigano also wrote that he discussed the sanctions on McCarrick several times with McCarrick's successor as archbishop of Washington, Cardinal Donald Wuerl, who Vigano said “lies shamelessly” in denying knowing about them. In one instance, Vigano wrote that he saw an announcement in an archdiocesan publication inviting young men interested in the priesthood to a meeting with McCarrick — a man who is alleged to have sexually abused seminarians! “I immediately phoned Cardinal Wuerl, who expressed his surprise to me, telling me that he knew nothing about that announcement and that he would cancel it,” Vigano wrote. “If, as he now continues to state, he knew nothing of the abuses committed by McCarrick and the measures taken by Pope Benedict, how can his answer be explained?” On Monday, a spokesman confirmed that Wuerl did cancel the event “at the nuncio's request.”

Vigano's accusations are serious and credible. He has everything to lose by making them public. He cited specific letters and documents that he and others sent to Rome — which he said are readily available in the files of the Holy See and the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington. The Vatican must now release them. And his account was backed on Monday by Monsignor Jean-

François Lantheaume, the former first counsellor at the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington, who said Vigano “tells the whole truth. I am a witness.” Most importantly, in his letter the archbishop declared that he is “ready to reaffirm them under oath by calling on God as my witness” — which means he is calling for his own eternal damnation if he is lying. Is Pope Francis willing to do the same?

Vigano is courageously sacrificing his own episcopal career to expose the truth. Now is the time for others with inside knowledge to step forward and do the same. Catholic cardinals wear a red hat to symbolize their willingness to shed the blood of martyrdom for Christ and His church. Sadly, few seem willing to risk their own position, much less their lives.

On his flight back from Ireland, Pope Francis responded to Vigano's testimony by declaring, “I will not say a single word on this.” Sorry, that's not good enough. Five hundred years ago, faithful Catholics waited too long to root out corruption in the Vatican — with disastrous consequences. We can't make the same mistake again.

Prison reform bill must be rescued

A prison reform bill that passed the House with a strong bipartisan majority is slowly dying in the Senate. It must be rescued and broadened.

The First Step Act focuses on ways to help federal prisoners prepare for a productive life once they leave prison and to support them in their search for employment. It is a thoughtful attempt to break the destructive cycle that results in more than half of federal prisoners returning to prison within a few years after their first release. Pilot programs have shown that recidivism can be sharply reduced by providing such support.

The lone problem with the First Step Act is that it addresses only the 225,000 inhabitants of federal prisons. That is just 15 percent of the nation's prison population. The bill doesn't help the far more numerous inmates transitioning from state prisons and local jails. It should provide states with grants to encourage the establishment of similar prison-to-society assistance programs.

South Carolina has shown that such programs can work. The state's comprehensive re-entry program, part of a partnership between the Department of Corrections and the Department of Employment and Workforce, began at a Manning facility and is being expanded to other sites. Almost 70 percent of the people who leave prison after taking part in the program find work within a year, which is nearly three times the national average, according to corrections chief Bryan Stirling.

In the long run, reducing the number of repeat offenders is the best way to address the burdensome cost of prisons. Instead, some states facing overcrowded prisons and prison riots are considering sentencing reforms like those enacted last year in Louisiana. Reducing sentences saves money in the short run, but it may prove to be a temporary respite unless the ex-offenders are successfully reintegrated into society. All it takes is one sensational crime to turn voters against what some hard-line legislators call “jailbreak” laws too lenient on prisoners.

Upfront costs of reintegration programs can be a major obstacle to state action. Federal grants could provide a helpful financial bridge to meet the start-up costs.

Meanwhile, the First Step Act is caught in a conflict between senators who seek federal sentencing reforms and those who strongly oppose them.



Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, wants to add bipartisan sentencing reforms that narrowly missed Senate passage in 2016 to the House legislation. That is adamantly opposed by Sen. John Kennedy, R-Louisiana, who opposed the sentencing reform bill passed by the Louisiana Legislature last year, and Sen. Tom Cotton, R-Arkansas, who argues that federal sentences are not tough enough.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, could sideline the entire prison reform bill to avoid a debate pitting Republicans against each other before the midterm elections. That would be a shame.

Sen. Grassley should do the right thing and drop his effort to attach sentencing reforms to the bill and instead focus his committee on broadening it to encourage state action on the prison-to-society transition. Sen. McConnell should then green-light that bill. Such a compromise would lead to meaningful assistance for people trying to put their lives back together and avoid a return trip to prison.

Opioid crisis is now statewide emergency

South Carolina recently got bad news on the level of the opioid abuse crisis in the state.

For the third year in a row, the number of opioid-involved overdose deaths has increased in the Palmetto State, according to data collected by the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control. From 2014 to 2017, the total number of deaths related to opioid overdose increased by 47 percent, from 508 to 748 deaths.

The total number of prescription drug-involved overdose deaths, which include non-opioid drugs, increased by 37 percent, from 572 deaths in 2014 to

782 in 2017. Heroin-involved overdose deaths saw a sharp increase of 153 percent, from 57 to 144 deaths. Overall, fentanyl-involved overdose deaths saw the largest increase of 432 percent, from 68 to 362 deaths from 2014 to 2017. Deaths due to methadone, however, continue to decrease from 79 in 2014 to 45 in 2017, which is consistent with national trends, as methadone is used for the treatment of opioid use disorder.

Toward understanding why the situation has reached the point of a statewide health emergency as declared by Gov. Henry McMaster, T&D Staff Writer Dionne Gleaton profiled the opioid crisis in an eye-opening three-part series in 2017 focusing on the extent of the problem, its direct impact on lives and what can be done.

Since the series, the state has formed Opioid Emergency Response Team, which is tasked with utilizing South Carolina's emergency management infrastructure to address the crisis.

Progress has been made. While the three major metropolitan areas (Charleston, Greenville and Richland counties) all saw considerable increases from 2016 to 2017 in opioid-involved deaths, Horry County, which has the largest burden of opioid misuse in the state, saw a substantial decrease in opioid-involved overdose deaths (24 percent, from 101 in 2016 to 77 in 2017). Efforts around response and prevention, such as a unified task force and coalition, have been implemented in Horry County, which may have contributed to the decline in the overdose death rate.

But there are miles to go. “This new data demonstrates the devastating effects that the opioid crisis continues to have on our state,” McMaster said. “While the combined efforts of the OERT's members and the many other South Carolinians dedicated to combating this public health emergency are having a positive impact, there is still much work to be done.”

Addressing opioid abuse as a crisis will be necessary, unfortunately, for the foreseeable future.

pharmaceutical effects and is used to treat epilepsy, depression, pain and other ailments.

Bradford describes that as “the gold rush” with hemp production, but he said he thinks the market will saturate quickly.

He said he thinks the flatlands of the Pee Dee region could be ideal for grain and fiber production of hemp.

According to research, the hemp plant can be used for grain production as a food oil for culinary use, and Bradford has used about nine plots on a half acre for his “genetics research lab.”

He said he’s building a foundation through genetics and taking an ideal model and trying to find the plants that fit inside that box.

He said he’s had seven plants survive this year and “one really nice plant” with an estimated 1,000 seeds.

“We can take this plant and clone it,” Bradford said, “and make 20 plants like this one. We get 1,000 seeds off of this and another 1,000 off the clones, that’s 20,000 seeds real quickly.”

Each week, he said he’s picked seeds from the plants and thinks there is merit in having a South Carolina-based seed for industrial hemp. Otherwise, our state will just be buying seeds from out of state every year, he said.

It’s farming “the old-fashioned way,” but Bradford thinks with the proper support and help, the process can be completed in about 18 months.

If South Carolina can put out a quality seed with 90 to 95 percent germination, Bradford said he thinks farmers here will buy it because it’s low risk.

Weathers and his staff said they want to support Bradford in his efforts.

“Obviously, he’s taking a very unique approach in that the harvest of seed will benefit this crop and the other growers in the years to come,” Weathers said. “The patience that he takes with his endeavors is very impressive. We have heard stories of germination problems of some of the seeds that the farmers have purchased; so, the fact that he’s working to give more assurances that a South Carolina-selected seed will do well in our soils is very reassuring. The work that Nat is doing is going to be very important next year and in the years beyond.”

Assistant Agriculture Commissioner Clint Leach said Bradford sticks out among all 20 farmers as the

most passionate.

He said, given the great work he’s done with water-melons and okra, Bradford is well equipped to try seeds for industrial hemp.

“What he’s doing with the grain seed is pretty interesting because he’s the only one out of the 20 doing it,” Leach said. “He could be kind of a gatekeeper, if you will, to seeds in South Carolina.”

MORE ON INDUSTRIAL HEMP

Historically designated as a banned crop by the federal government because the plant is from the same species as marijuana, hemp, however, has a significantly lower concentration of the chemical tetrahydrocannabinol (THC). That’s the primary chemical responsible for marijuana’s psychological effects, creating a euphoric high. By federal law, hemp must have less than 0.3 percent concentration of THC compared to marijuana’s 30 percent, and there is bipartisan support to legalize hemp to increase crop diversity and provide new agriculture for U.S. farmers.

Just as in South Carolina, many states have started pilot programs with selected farmers who have received special permitting.



COLUMBIA — After being sidelined for most of last season with a broken leg in the team's third game against Kentucky, standout South Carolina wide receiver Deebo Samuel is ready to step back on the gridiron this

Saturday against Coastal Carolina at Williams-Brice Stadium.

"I'm really ready to get back out there; it's been 11 months," Samuel said on Tuesday at a press conference at Williams-Brice Stadium. "I got stronger and faster. I had more time to develop over this past summer."

Darlington Throwback: Racers ready to blast through the past

DARLINGTON — If Kyle Busch needed extra motivation for the Southern 500, he's gotten it from Ernie Irvan — or, more specifically, Irvan's paint scheme from 20 years ago.

Busch, NASCAR's points leader, is itching to drive a Skittles-themed red car like Irvan used in 1998 when Darlington Raceway honors seven decades of stock car racing history at its latest throwback weekend.

"Seems like when we put a cool paint scheme on the car, we run better," Busch smiled.

He'll have plenty of competition on the track and in the garage as teams throughout the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series dress out for Darlington's latest celebration of the sport's deep, rich past of characters and seat-of-the-pants driving success.

For those unfamiliar with Southern 500 weekend, think Old Timers' Day at 180 mph.

Busch has loved coming to Darlington the past few years knowing he'll see things he may have only glimpsed in grainy race footage or photo

albums. Racers and crews break out vintage clothes and modified looks with young guns like Kyle Larson and Ryan Blaney sporting mustaches as part of their throwback weekend.

"I think a lot of guys really get into it," Busch said.

And rightly so, said past NASCAR champion Dale Jarrett, who was honored by Busch's paint scheme in the 2017 race.

"Fans like it, competitors like it," Jarrett said. "We've got a whole, new era of race drivers who are very successful out there, but for them to recognize where the sport came from and why they are able to do this day and time. It's important to them and for them to jump in be willing participants."

Brad Keselowski's No. 2 will be trimmed out Sunday night

like Rusty Wallace's old Miller Genuine Draft car. Clint Bowyer's No. 14 will honor Dale Jarrett's father, Hall of Famer Ned Jarrett, with the racing great's blue color scheme on the Ford Galaxie Jarrett used to win the 1965 Southern 500. And William Byron will run in a No. 24 painted like Jeff Gordon's memorable, multicolor rainbow racer.

"We have a lot of fun with it," Keselowski said.

Darlington Raceway has some things to show off, too. Since the last time the series was run there, the track underwent some \$7 million in improvements. Track leaders widened and modernized long-out-of-date seats and got rid of dilapidated metal bleachers — most of which looked as if they might be as old as the 69-year-old track.

There will also be a wall of honor in the front and back stretches of banners commemorating all 49 drivers who won Darlington races. "We think it's something unique to our track," Darlington president Kerry Tharp said.

Despite the sideshows, the centerpiece is the racing as NASCAR's top series returns

after its final week off of the season. There are two races left in the regular season — Indianapolis is the final event before the playoffs — with many drivers scrambling to lock up a win that will get them into the 16-driver chase for a title.

Kevin Harvick leads the series with seven victories with Busch right behind at six. Last year's NASCAR champion, Martin Truex Jr., is next with four and Bowyer follows with two. Five drivers have one victory apiece and the group of those winless this late in the season include former champions — and regular playoff participants — Jimmie Johnson, Keselowski and Matt Kenseth. Keselowski has clinched a playoff spot, although he'd love to enter the postseason off the high of a checkered flag.

Jarrett, who won three times at Darlington, believes fans love the close racing on the quirky, egg-shaped track and will keep coming back for these NASCAR celebrations.

"No matter how big the sport gets or what big cities we go to, it's important to be at places like Darlington," he said.

Fearsome foursome: Tigers' D-line looking to wreak havoc

CLEMSON — Clemson defensive end Clelin Ferrell is tired of the talk, no matter how deserved it may be for the Tigers' fearsome front four.

Ferrell is among the quartet of starters with end Austin Bryant and tackles Christian Wilkins and Dexter Lawrence who are all projected as high-round NFL draft picks next spring. They've been on the cover of Sports Illustrated and hear crazy predictions about 100 sacks and multiple shutouts ahead for No. 2 Clemson.

"It's kind of been the longest offseason between everything," said Ferrell, the 6-foot-5, 260-pound junior who's had 15.5 sacks and 30.5 tackles for loss the past two seasons. "We want to enjoy because we know were on the verge of something special if everything goes right."

Many say it already did for Clemson's defense. Wilkins, Ferrell and Bryant thought hard about the pros after last season, yet all returned to a stacked unit that added two five-star linemen in Xavier Thomas and K.J. Henry — both among the top college prospects in the country last year.

The four starters combined for 25 of Clemson's 46 sacks last season, a total that tied Southern Cal for most in the FBS.

Defensive coordinator Brent Venables has looked hard for signs these past eight months of his starting line living off

past success, coasting due to NFL potential or waiting to kick things into gear until the regular season. He found none of that.

"They've been dialed in since they've been here," Venables said. "They've taken ownership and accountability, shown up every day ready to work."

Venables has coached this sort of group before.

In 2014, the Tigers led the country in total defense anchored by a front of ends Vic Beasley and Corey Crawford and tackles Grady Jarrett and Deshawn Williams. All four played in the NFL with Beasley and Jarrett helping the Atlanta Falcons reach the Super Bowl two seasons ago.

Once Wilkins made the choice to return to school — Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said all his returning defensive linemen came back in large part because their projections from the NFL draft advisory board were lower than anticipated — he put aside disappointment and the outside talk of others. He understands the excitement (the SI cover proclaimed the four "The Best Ever"), but is just ready to do what he does best in creating havoc on the field.

"I feel like we just like to go to work and handle our business," said Wilkins, a 6-4, 300-pound grad student.

Wilkins is probably the most high profile of the four. He played from the moment

he stepped on campus in 2015 and made headlines when he became Clemson's first defensive lineman to catch a pass on a 31-yard fake punt throw in a bowl win over Oklahoma.

Wilkins caught a touchdown pass the next season and picked up some dubious attention in Clemson's College Football Playoff semifinal game against Ohio State when he placed his hand in an inappropriate spot on an opponent's body. That was largely forgotten a week later when the Tigers defeated Alabama 35-31 to win the 2016 national title with the flexible, athletic Wilkins doing pirouettes and splits in celebration.

Wilkins and the Tigers were unhappy last season when Alabama's defense stifled Clemson 24-6, a defeat that has fueled the team through offseason workouts. The opener comes Saturday at home against Furman.

Wilkins is confident he and his line mates — he's the leader of what he calls the "Power Rangers," based on, yep, the children's show — can have a big year if they keep focused on what's important.

Bryant, who had 8.5 sacks a year ago, summed it up best. No one will care, he said, about magazine covers and hype if Clemson's line doesn't play up to its potential. "We don't bring it up," Bryant said. "Because it's really not important."

For now, though, Tyler is just glad to be back from his injury and in the thick of things as the new season gets underway.

"I started out and got hurt in the first game last year, and that put me back a little bit, but I'll be back and in a bigger role this year," Tyler said. "I spent a whole bunch of time doing rehab and things like that. It's been a long journey -- watching spring (practice) and then after the spring coming back and watching them, I'm excited about getting the season started out," Tyler said.

"The preseason has been so long, hard and hot, I'm just ready to get the season started, have a great game and a great season," he said. Saturday's game at

Williams-Brice Stadium won't be Tyler's first, since the Shrine Bowl selection played as a junior for Sumter High in the 2013 4A Division I state championship game against Dutch Fork.

However, Tyler said this week's game promises to be a bit different.

"It's definitely going to be different having that many people there," Tyler said. "We've just got to stay focused and have our minds right. I just want to have a great season on special teams and on offense and make as many plays as I can and try to be great for my teammates."

Tyler said he enjoys special teams because it's always an opportunity to make something happen.

"There's always a chance to make a great play for the team and get the team hyped," he said. "That's the part I like about it."

Samuel has also been limiting his distractions.

"Coach (Bryan) McClendon keeps me off social media as much as he can; he didn't want me to get caught up in all the rankings, what people got me projected, this, that and the third," he said. "That's why I deactivated my Twitter and Facebook and not gotten into all that."

Samuel can sense that his teammates are ready for the season to get started.

"I feel it more in the locker room," he said. "Guys have been waiting on this day for about a year now. Everybody's getting ready to get back out there and play."

However, Samuel said he hasn't really felt what the atmosphere on campus is like because he only has one class — retail management. Samuel is on track to graduate in December.

When asked if he feels like he has to prove anything this season, Samuel said he doesn't

Head coach Will Muschamp has been using phrases such as "So what, now what?" and "all gas, no brakes" to motivate the team to do better.

"So what, now what?" is really like a mentality of if you mess up this play, you can't let it affect another play," Samuel said. "And 'All gas, no brakes,' I mean we just put the pedal to the floor and just keep going, pushing each other as a team."

One of the biggest challenges for Samuel has been getting back into "football shape".

"I think that's been one of the main things, Coach Muschamp and B-Mac (McClendon) have been pushing me to get back in shape, as I was last year," he said.

Clemson transfer Belk can play immediately at USC

COLUMBIA (AP) — South Carolina says highly touted freshman defensive lineman Josh Belk has been declared eligible to play immediately and doesn't have to sit out a year under NCAA transfer rules.

Belk graduated from high school in December and enrolled at rival Clemson. He later told Tigers coach Dabo

Swinney that circumstances changed in his life and asked to leave.

Coming out of Lewisville High School, Belk was ranked as the 96th best college prospect by ESPN and could be an important part of the

Gamecocks' defense.

Belk is eligible to play Saturday when South Carolina opens the season against Coastal Carolina.

The Gamecocks made a similar request for immediate eligibility for former Southern Cal defensive back Jamel Cook but have not heard from the NCAA.

Zverev finally makes his way into 3rd round at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Alexander Zverev is finally hanging around for the third round of the U.S. Open.

The No. 4 seed beat Nicolas Mahut 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 on Thursday, winning a second-round match for the first time in his four trips to Flushing Meadows.

The German leads the ATP Tour in wins this year, has already won three ATP Masters 1000 titles and at 21 is the popular pick as the young star most likely to have a Grand Slam breakthrough and the end the stranglehold veterans such as Rafael Nadal, Roger Federer and Novak Djokovic have had on the majors.

Maybe it will come during these two weeks. Zverev — perhaps benefiting from a tame early draw that started with two lucky losers — hasn't dropped more than four games in a set thus far.

Federer and Djokovic were also in action on another hot day, the third in a row with an extreme heat policy in effect. Men were permitted a 10-minute break between the third and fourth sets of their singles matches, while the break came after the second set for the women.

Federer had an afternoon match against Frenchman Benoit Paire, looking to improve to 18-0 in second-round matches at the U.S. Open. The No. 2 seed has won all six meetings, though Paire had two match points in their last matchup in June in Germany before the five-

time U.S. Open champion won 9-7 in a third-set tiebreaker.

He would next face No. 30 seed Nick Kyrgios, who beat France's Pierre-Hughes Herbert 4-6, 7-6 (6), 6-3, 6-0 in a match that featured controversy, when umpire Mohamed Lahyani climbed down from his chair to urge the Australian to give a better effort while trailing 0-3 in the second set.

Sandgren at night. Marin Cilic, the No. 7 seed and the 2014 U.S. Open champion, was to face qualifier Hubert Hurkacz.

Angelique Kerber, the 2016 champion and No. 4 seed, and sixth-seeded Caroline Garcia both were pushed to third sets, with Kerber beating Johanna Larsson 6-2, 5-7, 6-4, and Garcia outlasting Monica Puig 6-2, 1-6, 6-4. No. 5 Petra Kvitova had an easier time, beating Yafan Wang in straight sets.

OSU trustee resigns saying Meyer deserved stiffer penalty

COLUMBUS, Ohio — An Ohio State University trustee who thought football coach Urban Meyer deserved more than a three-game suspension and resigned from the board over it said Thursday that he was alone in advocating a stiffer penalty when trustees discussed the matter.

Former board chairman Jeffrey Wadsworth resigned after Ohio State suspended Meyer and athletic director Gene Smith last week following a two-week investigation, which found they had tolerated bad behavior for years from a now-fired assistant coach also accused of but not charged with domestic violence.

"Since I fundamentally disagree with the outcome it would be hypocritical of me to continue as a Trustee," Wadsworth told board chairman Michael Gasser in an Aug. 22 email, the day of the suspension, and released by the university on Thursday.

Conway has senior Dequinton Brady at quarterback, but this is his first year behind center on a regular basis. He is 27 for 51 for 314 yards and one touchdown against one interception. He is also the team's leading rusher with 79 yards on 16 carries. Jammarian Legette had 69 yards on 11 carries.

Xavier Kinlaw is Brady's top target with nine catches for 183 yards.

Sumter has been strong both running and throwing the football so far, averaging 171.5 on the ground and 174.5 through the air.

Jonathan Henry leads the rushing

attack with 266 yards and six scores on 45 carries. Quarterback Ontra' Harvin, though not throwing a lot, is making the most of his opportunities. He is 21 for 25 for 323 yards and four touchdowns against no interceptions.

Interestingly, Harvin had to take over at quarterback at halftime of last year's game against Conway when starter Zykiem Jackson suffered a season-ending injury. Harvin went on to start the regular-season finale as well as Sumter's two playoff games.

"I'm sure he's excited to have this chance with an offense that is better suited for his style," Barnes said of Harvin going against Conway. "He's going to be much more prepared. He's been very good this year. He's made a lot of big plays at big points in the ball games."

Tony Dinkins-McCall has been the favorite target for Harvin with 10 catches for 156 yards and one TD. However, he is one of nine Gamecocks with at least one catch this season, and the other three touchdown passes are distributed among three players.

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

Several dead, scores injured as bus, truck collide in New Mexico

A horrific collision between a Greyhound bus and a semi-truck on an interstate in New Mexico killed several passengers and sent scores of others to area hospitals, authorities reported Thursday. Officers and rescue workers were on scene but did not provide details about how many people were killed or injured, or what caused the crash.

Greyhound said the bus was heading from Albuquerque to Phoenix with 47 passengers.

Justice Department backs Asians' bias lawsuit against Harvard

The Trump administration on Thursday sided with a group that alleges Harvard University's admission policies discriminate against Asian-American applicants.

The Department of Justice threw its support to students and parents and urged that their discrimination claims be tested at trial.

The department took aim at Harvard's use of a "personal rating" in its selection process asserted the rating system is subjective and "may be biased against Asian Americans."

Man charged with threatening to kill Boston Globe journalists

A California man was arrested and charged Thursday with making violent threats to Boston Globe employees, calling the newspaper the "enemy of the people," the U.S. attorney's office for Massachusetts said.

Robert D. Chain, 68, of Encino, was charged with making threatening communications in interstate commerce, which carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison.

Small air leak in Russian capsule patched at space station

Astronauts scrambled Thursday to patch a tiny hole in a Russian capsule that was allowing air to leak from the International Space Station.

NASA and Russian space officials stressed the six astronauts were in no danger. The leak was detected Wednesday night – possibly from a micrometeorite strike – when it caused a small drop in cabin pressure.

The crew taped over the hole and applied sealant Thursday morning. Flight controllers monitored the cabin pressure.

18 killed, including children, as Ethiopian military copter crashes

Ethiopian state media say a military helicopter has crashed and killed all 18 people on board, including two children.

Police official Aschalew Alemu told the Ethiopian News Agency that the crash occurred Thursday morning in the Oromia region.

The helicopter was traveling from the eastern city of Dire Dawa to an air base southeast of the capital, Addis Ababa.

McCain returns to Washington, one last time

3 days of tributes to commemorate hero's life begin in nation's capital

WASHINGTON – When Sen. John McCain left the nation's capital in December to celebrate Christmas and battle brain cancer in Arizona, friends and colleagues vowed he would return.

For three tribute-filled days beginning Thursday night, their hopes will be realized – posthumously.

It will be a hero's welcome for the former Navy pilot who spent 5½ years imprisoned in Vietnam and a public servant who spent 36 years in a political career that took him from the House to the Senate and nearly to the White House – twice.

The swashbuckling style that led to McCain's label as a maverick will give way to more decorous forms of affection, first inside the U.S. Capitol, then at Washington National Cathedral, and finally overlooking the Severn River at his beloved U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

The 81-year-old's belief in the need for bipartisanship will be on display at the ceremonies and services, including a full-dress memorial during which the two presidents who vanquished him – Republican George W. Bush and Democrat Barack Obama – will speak.

But even as he settles those old scores, one will remain: President

Donald Trump, who had called McCain a "dummy" rather than a hero, was not invited. Vice President Mike Pence will speak at one event, and three members of Trump's administration will attend another.

On the high side, there was his successful, bipartisan effort to regulate the financing of political campaigns. His winning the Republican nomination for president in 2008 after being written off. His chairmanship of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

On the low side, there was his early entanglement in the "Keating Five," a group of senators scandalized after intervening on behalf of a failing savings

Trump's woes shadow high court nominee

Liberal groups seek Kavanaugh recusals

WASHINGTON – Brett Kavanaugh has yet to serve a day on the Supreme Court, but he already faces calls to recuse himself from potential cases involving his benefactor, President Donald Trump.

The argument goes: If Kavanaugh wins Senate confirmation after his Judiciary Committee hearing next week, he could tilt the balance of power on the high court to conservatives – possibly for decades to come.

Long before that, the court could be asked to referee a dispute involving Trump. Could he be indicted? Subpoenaed? Could he fire special counsel Robert Mueller or order the Russia investigation closed? What constitutes obstruction of justice? Could he even pardon himself?

Kavanaugh may find himself in the middle of those questions. He would owe his lofty position to the president who nominated him.

What's more, he is an advocate of a "unitary executive" model of government, in which the president wields more power. In 2009, he wrote that presidents should be immune from criminal investigations and prosecutions, as well as personal civil suits, until after leaving office.

"I believe it vital that the president be able to focus on his never-ending tasks with as few distractions as possible," Kavanaugh wrote. He recommended that Congress pass a law exempting the president from prosecution, investigation – even questioning.


The combination of factors led liberal interest groups to urge that the

Australia to bar Chelsea Manning's tour

Chelsea Manning, a transgender rights activist who was convicted of leaking U.S. classified documents, will not be allowed to enter Australia for a five-city speaking tour, including stops in New Zealand, her event organizer said Thursday.

Think Inc. said it had received a notice of intention from the government to deny Manning entry.

Manning was scheduled to open a speaking tour at the Sydney Opera House on Sunday. Other stops in Aus-

tralia included Melbourne and Brisbane, and two appearances were planned in Wellington, and Auckland, New Zealand.

The event organizer called on Manning's supporters to lobby new Immigration Minister David Coleman to allow her into Australia. While she can appeal, past precedent suggests the decision already has been made.

Think Inc. said it had given the government more than 10 letters of support defending Manning.

"Ms. Manning offers formidable ideas and an insightful perspective, which we are hoping to bring to the forefront of Australian dialogue," Think Inc. director Suzi Jamil said.

A change.org petition has received more than 12,000 signatures.

Amnesty International accused the government of trying to silence Manning. "By refusing her entry, the Australian government would send a chilling message that freedom of speech is not valued by our government," Amnesty International national director Claire Mallinson said.

and loan. His frustrated efforts to solve the nation's immigration crisis. His choice of Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin as his 2008 running mate and ultimate defeat.

Presidents as 'friends'

The pomp and circumstance was to start Thursday when McCain's body was to depart Arizona from Goldwater Air National Guard Base, named for former Sen. Barry Goldwater, who McCain replaced in 1987.

From the Joint Base Andrews military facility in Maryland, McCain was to be taken to the U.S. Capitol, where he began his public service career in 1983. There he will lie in State on Friday, becoming only the 31st person to be so honored in 166 years – a list that includes Abraham Lincoln, John F. Ken-

edy, Ronald Reagan and unknown soldiers from the two world wars, Korea and Vietnam.

Following an 11 a.m. EDT ceremony at which Pence, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and House Speaker Paul Ryan will speak, the public will be invited to pass by McCain's casket from about 1 to 8 p.m.

On Saturday, a motorcade will take the late senator along Constitution Avenue to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, where his widow, Cindy McCain, will lay a ceremonial wreath honoring those who lost their lives in the war that cost McCain his freedom.

Then it will continue to Washington National Cathedral, where funeral services have been held for 15 presidents dating to William McKinley in 1901, and where former president Woodrow Wilson is buried.

In addition to Bush and Obama, speakers at Saturday's service include former secretary of State Henry Kissinger, former Sen. Joe Lieberman and TV commentator Meghan McCain, the late senator's daughter. The presidents and others are identified on McCain's website first as "friend."

Finally on Sunday, McCain will be moved not to Arlington National Cemetery – where his father and grandfather, both four-star Navy admirals, are buried – but to a spot overlooking the Severn River at the U.S. Naval Academy, beside his old Navy buddy, Charles "Chuck" Larson.

Services there will be private and will include tributes from Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., McCain's closest friend in the Senate; former CIA director David Petraeus; and McCain's son Jack, a Navy helicopter pilot.

'Not even close'

McCain's last days in Washington included a stay at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in nearby Bethesda, Maryland, to treat an infection stemming from treatment for glioblastoma, the most deadly form of brain cancer. By January, however, his return was rumored.

"We need his voice now more than ever," Graham mused.

Happily for his allies and to the chagrin of his opponents, McCain didn't stop speaking out during his illness, even imparting a farewell statement delivered after his death Saturday.

Senate delay Kavanaugh's confirmation hearing, which is set to begin Tuesday. Short of that, they want him to pledge that he would stand aside in cases involving the president.

"A Justice Kavanaugh could be deciding the entire fate of a Trump presidency and Donald Trump's entire future," says Neera Tanden, president of the liberal Center for American Progress. "We could have a 5-4 decision, and I think people would forever question it."

Recusals are up to each justice and customarily are reserved for cases in which he or she has had prior involvement or a personal stake in the outcome. Kavanaugh has played no direct role in any of the controversies that could land the president in court.

"He has not been a part of any suits related to President Trump, special counsel Mueller or the subjects of the Russia investigation," says Gabe Roth, executive director of Fix the Court, which advocates for judicial transparency. "Whatever Kavanaugh's views on the unitary executive may be, the letter of the conflict-of-interest law does not suggest that a recusal on Trump-Russia would be required."

Nixon, Clinton ... and Trump?

Conservative groups say charges that Kavanaugh would be compromised on a Trump lawsuit are unfounded. They note that Justices Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan did not recuse themselves from challenges to the Affordable Care Act, even though it was the signature achievement of President Barack Obama, who nominated them.

"No nominee should ever make a blanket promise to recuse from cases merely because those cases are very important to the president who picked him," says Ed Whelan, president of the conservative Ethics and Public Policy Center and a Kavanaugh defender.

In 1974 and again in 1997, the Supreme Court issued unanimous verdicts against sitting presidents who had nominated some of the justices.

In U.S. v. Nixon, the court ruled 8-0 that President Richard Nixon had to

turn over tape recordings that implicated him in the Watergate cover-up. Chief Justice Warren Burger, a Nixon appointee, wrote the opinion and was joined by two of the president's other nominees.

Justice William Rehnquist, who later became chief justice, recused himself because of his close association with John Mitchell, the former attorney general and Nixon re-election campaign director later sent to prison for Watergate crimes.

Kavanaugh has lauded the Nixon ruling several times, even calling it one of the "greatest moments in American judicial history." But during a panel discussion in 1999, he said it might have been "wrongly decided – heresy though it is to say so –" because it enforced a subpoena from a subordinate executive branch official.

In the latter case, Clinton v. Jones, the court ruled 9-0 that President Bill Clinton could not delay until he was out of office a sexual harassment lawsuit brought by former Arkansas state employee Paula Jones. Two Clinton nominees who are still on the court, Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Stephen Breyer, joined the opinion.

Kavanaugh was a lawyer on independent counsel Ken Starr's staff in the late 1990s and helped write its report on Clinton, which led to the president's impeachment. But in 2016, he said the Supreme Court's 1988 decision upholding provisions of the independent counsel law should be overturned.

The law expired in 1999, when it was replaced by Justice Department regulations governing special counsels, including Robert Mueller. Critics of the law, including Justice Antonin Scalia at the time, called it an infringement on a president's executive power.

"It's been effectively overruled," Kavanaugh said at the American Enterprise Institute event in 2016, "but I would put the final nail in."

Pence tries to clarify Trump 'violence' remark

WASHINGTON – Weighing in on President Donald Trump's warning that there will be violence by his opponents if Democrats win control of Congress this fall, Vice President Mike Pence said he took the president to mean that Democrats want to undo everything Trump has done.

"But the president's point as I took it, from where I was seated, was that the Democrat party in Congress is absolutely committed to reversing everything that we've been able to do for the American people," Pence told the Christian Broadcasting Network in an interview excerpt that aired Thursday.

On Monday, Trump and Pence feted dozens of Christian pastors, ministers and other supporters from the evangelical community at a White House dinner.

Trump warned that Democrats "will overturn everything that we've done and they'll do it quickly and violently," according to an audiotape of his remarks provided to The New York Times by someone who attended the event.

Asked by reporters Wednesday what he meant by the comments, Trump said, "I just hope there won't be violence."

"There's a lot of unnecessary vio-

lence all over the world, but also in this country, and I don't want to see it," he said.

In his remarks to evangelicals, Trump mentioned antifa, the name for loosely affiliated, left-leaning anti-racist groups that monitor and track the activities of local neo-Nazis.

"When you look at antifa, and you look at some of these groups, these are violent people," Trump said, according to the Times.

Asked why Trump mentioned antifa, Pence said: "Obviously we condemn any examples of violence on the streets of this country, zero tolerance for any violence against Americans."

Pence said the reason why evangelical leaders were invited to the dinner was to make sure that the American people know that Democrats want to reverse Trump's agenda, including his appointment of "strong conservatives" to the federal courts.

"That's what I took the president to say," he said.

Trump's 2016 victory was boosted by white evangelicals, 81 percent of whom voted for him.

And evangelical leaders say Trump has delivered on promises to promote "religious freedoms," restrict abortion and appoint conservative judges.

Feds may have overpaid more than \$380M in SSI payments

WASHINGTON – More than 77,000 recipients of Social Security payments for the disabled or elderly may have been overpaid a total of \$380 million because their cases have not been reviewed in more than a decade, federal investigators estimate in a report released this week.

An estimated 1.1 million recipients of Supplemental Security Income payments have not had their cases reviewed – called a "redetermination" – in more than 10 years because of budget limitations, the Social Security Administration's Inspector General estimated.

That's about 13 percent of the nation's SSI recipients. A total of \$51.4 billion in SSI payments were made to 8.2 million recipients in fiscal 2017. The agency completed 2.6 million determinations.

Redeterminations are scheduled annually if something is likely to have changed in the recipient's life or once every six years if a change in circumstances is unlikely.

The reviews look at factors such as income, resources and living arrangements that may affect a recipient's eligibility.

At first, reviews were conducted every three years, but that changed in the

1990s – in response to staff cuts – to every six years for those cases where a change in circumstances was unlikely.

Federal investigators mailed questionnaires to some of those people whose cases were selected for review. For some, a detailed analysis was conducted. The recipients who were found to have been overpaid had too much in assets or income or in-kind support, or some combination of factors.

In one example cited in the report, a South Carolina woman had not had a review since 2004 and was found to have received income from her common-law spouse, who had died in 2016. SSA recovered \$9,531 in overpayments.

In response to the Social Security IG's audit, the agency's Office of Quality Review is now planning a similar study in which 400 cases will be reviewed. In those cases, a redetermination has not been conducted in more than 10 years.

In its response to the report, the Social Security Administration said it expected to complete 2.9 million redeterminations in fiscal 2018, which began Oct. 1, 2017.

This is not the first time the issue of overpayments of SSI has been raised. The Government Accountability Office designated SSI as one of its high-risk programs in 1997 after several years of reporting on several problems including overpayment detection and recovery practices.

Grizzly bear hunt in judge's hands

Season could start Saturday in 2 states

Grizzly bear hunting season – the first in the Lower 48 states in more than four decades – is scheduled to begin Saturday in Idaho and Wyoming, but only if a federal judge gives a go-ahead after a hearing Thursday on whether to reapply the Endangered Species Act to protect them.

U.S. District Judge Dana Christensen planned to hear appeals in Helena, Montana, from wildlife advocates and Native American tribes who want to reinstate federal protections that were lifted last year for about 700 grizzlies living in and around Yellowstone National Park.

Hunters say they should be allowed to kill a small number of grizzlies because the population has grown large enough to prompt President Donald Trump's administration to remove the animals' special protections last year.

Environmental activists argue that the hunt is unnecessary and inhumane. They want the judge to protect the bears under the Endangered Species Act, the way a judge did in 2007.

"No one is killing a grizzly bear to eat it," said Melissa Thomas, executive director of Wyoming Wildlife Advocates, which opposes the hunt. "This is about ego."

An appeal to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is likely by whoever is on the losing side.

The hunters are ready. Out of thousands of applicants, 12 hunters in Wyoming and one in Idaho have been issued licenses for Saturday's opening day. It would be Wyoming's first hunt since 1974 and Idaho's first since 1946.

"This is a high-stakes deadline," said Tim Preso, an attorney for Earthjustice representing several advocacy groups and the Northern Cheyenne tribe. "We're down to the wire."

The restrictions were put in place in the Lower 48 states in 1975 to protect the last of the tens of thousands of bears who used to roam the territory between the Pacific Ocean and the Great Plains. Hunters killed most of them in the 19th and early 20th centuries, leaving about 1,700 in all of the Lower 48 states, primarily in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho. Alaska's population of 30,000 grizzlies is considered a distinct group.

In Yellowstone National park, the grizzly population had dwindled to just 136 before the 1975 restrictions were ordered to protect the bears and their habitat as the population recovered.

The numbers of bears matters because the legal protections can be withdrawn only if the population of bears is "self sustaining," meaning enough baby bears are born each year to offset deaths. And bears die from both natural causes and human intervention, largely when hunters kill them to protect themselves or when state wildlife officials euthanize bears that have become accustomed to humans and their garbage.

Wildlife officials in Wyoming last year killed at least 14 grizzly bears that attacked livestock or threatened humans. Hunters killed another nine bears that were threatening them, and at least one bear was killed by a car. Many of Wyoming's grizzly bears live around Grand Teton National Park outside Jackson, and photographing them from the roadside is popular with tourists.

Hunters would be banned from stalking the bears in either Teton or adjacent Yellowstone national parks, but those bears are fair game if they leave the protection of park boundaries. In all, the area in which the bears live covers about

28,000 square miles, about the size of South Carolina. An adult male grizzly can roam over an area the size of New York City.

The grizzly hunt is set to begin in two phases, one on Sept. 1 and the other on Sept. 15, and state wildlife officials say they can cancel it if the judge orders them to.

Last year's decision by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service turned management of the bears over to the three states, which agreed on a plan that set hunting quotas based on the number of deaths each year to ensure the population stays above 600 animals.

Idaho's hunting quota is one bear. Wyoming's hunt is in two phases: Sept. 1 opens the season in an outlying area with a quota of 12 bears, and Sept. 15 starts the season in prime grizzly habitat near Yellowstone and Grand Teton national parks. One female or 10 males can be killed in those areas. Montana officials decided not to hold a hunt this year.

Up to 22 bears can be killed in both seasons, although that number is unlikely because the death of one female would stop the hunt starting Sept. 15 near the national parks. Bear hunting is not allowed in Yellowstone or Grand Teton.

While the grizzly population in the "Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem" is much smaller than it once was, the bears – which can grow to 700 pounds among adult males – pose an undeniable threat to people who choose to live near them, threatening people using public land and killing young elk or calves just for sport.

"It's not being bloodthirsty. The fact of the matter is that we need to do something for the benefit of the bear," said hunting guide Sy Gilliland, a Wyoming hunting industry spokesman. "We can't turn the clock back and remove the people from Wyoming. The bear is overflowing. He just needs to have his number trimmed back for the benefit of the species overall."

Fields trial to stay in Charlottesville

The judge in the case of the Ohio man accused of killing counterprotester Heather Heyer has declined the defense's motion for a change of venue, according to the NBC29 TV station in Charlottesville, Virginia.

James Alex Fields, 21, faces first-degree murder and a number of other charges related to last August's car attack on a crowd of demonstrators protesting against a white nationalist rally in Charlottesville.

Fields' attorney, Denise Lunsford, filed a motion Aug. 14 arguing that either the trial should be moved to another jurisdiction or jurors should be brought in from elsewhere.

"Community prejudice against Fields in the City of Charlottesville, the impact of the events on the Charlottesville residents and the widespread publicity this case has received are reasonably certain to prevent a fair and reasonable trial," the motion reads.

Lunsford presented more than 2,000 pages of news media articles to support her contention. The judge was not swayed.

Fields allegedly participated in a white supremacist demonstration on Aug. 12, 2017, and is accused of ramming his car into the protesters later that day, sending bodies flying and others scrambling for safety. More than two dozen were injured in the attack.

The incidents surrounding the "Unite the Right" rally in the university town drew widespread attention, which was heightened when President Donald Trump said of the clashes between white nationalists and counterprotesters, "I think there is blame on both sides."

In addition to the first-degree murder charges in Charlottesville, Fields was charged with 30 federal hate crimes, which could carry the death penalty. He pleaded not guilty.

This month, two rallies observed the one-year anniversary of the confrontations. In Charlottesville, demonstrators chanted and condemned bigotry on a day that included a vigil for Heyer and a speech by her mother, Susan Bro.

Fields' trial is scheduled to start Nov. 26 and is expected to last about three weeks.

Detroit schools are shutting off drinking water

DETROIT – Detroit's city school district is shutting off drinking water to all of its schools after test results found elevated levels of lead or copper in 16 of 24 schools recently tested.

In a statement Wednesday, Superintendent Nikolai Vitti of the Detroit Public Schools Community District said he had initiated water testing in all 106 school buildings in the spring to ensure the safety of students and employees. Water at 18 schools previously had been shut off because of high levels of the heavy metals.

"Although we have no evidence that there are elevated levels of copper or lead in our other schools where we are awaiting test results, out of an abundance of caution and concern for the safety of our students and employees I am turning off all drinking water in our schools until a deeper and broader analysis can be conducted to determine the long-term solutions for all schools," Vitti said.

The school district serves almost 50,000 students.

Both lead and copper leach into drinking water primarily through corroded pipes and other plumbing fixtures, according to the federal Environmental Protection Agency. Health problems can range from stomach aches to brain damage.

The EPA ceiling for lead in drinking water is 15 parts per billion, and even 5 ppb can be a cause for concern. For copper, the limit is 1.3 parts per million.

The human body needs a trace amount of copper to function, but no amount of lead is safe, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

That's especially true for children because a smaller amount can be po-

tent in a small body and because their bodies and brains are developing rapidly.

"This was not required by federal, state or city law or mandate," Vitti said. "This testing, unlike previous testing, evaluated all water sources from sinks to drinking fountains."

The Detroit Free Press was shadowing Vitti on a day in May when the issue of water quality in the schools came up during a Cabinet meeting. Earlier that day, Vitti had learned that test results at several schools had come back showing elevated lead levels.

"I'm not playing around with this. ... It's a safety issue," Vitti said during that meeting.

The district's building problems have been a constant source of frustration for Vitti. Earlier this summer, Vitti released details from a facilities review that found the district would need to spend \$500 million now to fix the poor conditions in its schools.

That price tag would rise to \$1.4 billion in five years if the district did nothing.

'American Masters' kicks off celebration of artists

"American Masters" dedicates the next two weeks to American artists, airing four documentaries on Friday nights from tonight to Sept. 14. They include a portrait of painter and printmaker Elizabeth Murray (Sept. 7), featuring the voice of Meryl Streep reading her journals, a look at Andrew Wyeth (also Sept. 7) and a portrait of graffiti artist Jean-Michel Basquiat (Sept. 14).

Tonight's "American Masters" (9 p.m., PBS, TV-PG, check local listings) profiles sculptor Eva Hesse, who challenged some of the geometric formalism of "modern" sculpture in the 1960s and broke into the boys' club of the New York art scene. A refugee from Hitler's Germany who arrived in America in 1939, she was just beginning to receive wide acclaim when she died of a brain tumor in 1970.

The period Australian soap opera "A Place to Call Home" returns. Acorn will stream the first two episodes of its sixth and final season today. New installments arrive on a weekly basis.

Set in a 1950s Australia when perfectly respectable people still harbored deep prejudices against upstarts and outsiders, "Place" stars Marta Dusseldorp as a noble and forthright nurse who marries into a posh Australian family after a harrowing war experience.

"Place" uses every melodramatic trick imaginable, including founding children, loveless marriages, scheming in-laws, infertility, secret abortions and sudden pregnancies. As in soaps of old, virtuous characters are very good and wicked ones truly hiss-worthy. "Downton Abbey" by way of "Dynasty" with a touch of Douglas Sirk, "Place" may be

dismissed as a "guilty" pleasure, but only by those too snobby to admit that they love its old-fashioned appeal.

If any show is the polar opposite of "A Place to Call Home," it's "Ozark" (TV-MA), now streaming its second season on Netflix. Laura Linney and Jason Bateman star in this dark satire of the American family, a tale of a secret money launderer being pursued and compromised by a drug cartel only to land in the Missouri vacationland, where he and his family gain the attention of a backwoods criminal syndicate.

Amazon Prime's "Tom Clancy's Jack Ryan" also begins streaming today. Look for more on this in tomorrow's column.

TCM wraps up its Summer Under the Stars festival with a daylong celebration of the films of Joan Crawford. She was often typecast as the intense middle-aged woman, from the neurotic, possessive society dame in the 1946 melodrama "Humoresque" (4 p.m.), to the perfectionist housewife in "Harriet Craig" (10 p.m.), to an ax-murderer in the 1964 shocker "Strait-Jacket" (2 a.m.), which was the low-rent follow-up to her standout role in the 1962 classic "What Ever Happened to Baby Jane?" (3:45 a.m.), recently featured in FX's character study "Feud," starring Jessica Lange and Susan Sarandon.

Weekend programming offers something for everyone

This has been an interesting spring and summer for fans of "The Office." First, we had to imagine the lovable Pam Beesly (Jenna Fischer) as a miserable woman trapped in a mortgage with her man-child husband (Oliver Hudson, "Nashville") in ABC's comedy "Splitting Up Together."

Now we get to see Jim Halpert (John Krasinski) as an action hero, the star of Amazon Prime's new series "Tom Clancy's Jack Ryan," now streaming. "Jack Ryan" offers few updates on a genre well explored by "24" and "Homeland." And it takes its time getting to its strengths, which are cinematic action scenes featuring intense firefights between Americans and shadowy terrorists.

It sets up Jack's story with an intro that seems purposefully slow, frequently dull and astoundingly predictable.

Flashing back to 1983, we first see two nameless Lebanese boys dancing to a cassette boombox playing Men Without Hats' "Safety Dance." How much do you want to bet their days of safety are numbered?


And when a youthful Jack Ryan has a near miss with a foul-mouthed commuter while racing his bicycle to work, you all but know that the driver is going to turn out to be his new boss, James Greer (Wendell Pierce).

Greer has been busted from top-level CIA honcho to over-seeing number crunchers, including Ryan, a cubicle-bound analyst who could have made a killing on Wall Street but prefers to follow the money trail of evildoers.

Clancy novels often accentuated gadgetry and intelligence-gathering procedure over character development. One review of his early novels compared them to "reading the Sears Catalog." "Jack Ryan" honors his dubious legacy with some mind-numbing technical jargon.

It takes little more than a half hour for the plot to whisk Ryan away from office drudgery to a field operation in Yemen, where he's assigned to help debrief suspected money-men for "the next bin Laden."

Not to give too much away, but things don't go according to plan. This marks the onset of military action and hand-to-

hand combat (the real reason for watching a show like this), as well as brief stabs at black humor from over-deployed soldiers. How do you break down a blindfolded terror suspect? Play Toby Keith songs at full volume.

Best known for his likable, everyman comedy roles, Krasinski more than acquits himself as Ryan, seen here as a haunted Iraq War vet still capable of throwing and receiving a punch.

It remains to be seen if action roles will be his new destination. At best, Krasinski seems to be auditioning to be a pliable star of thrillers of the Tom Hanks' "Da Vinci Code" variety, a mild-mannered, educated man, well past youth, but not too long in the tooth to avoid a fight.

"Dinner for Two" (7 p.m. and 9 p.m. Sunday, TV One) may not be for every taste. Mourning a past relationship and fearing that his addictions are spiraling out of control, Chris (Tristan "Mack" Wilds, "The Wire") re-creates a romantic meal with his ex, Angela (Chaley Rose, "Nashville"), not so much to win her back but to appreciate what they had and lost and to contemplate whether it's even worth going on. That's a lot for one menu.

Fans who can't get enough musical competition series can enjoy "The X-Factor U.K." (8 p.m. Sunday and Monday, AXS TV).
